Courses last from 26 to 64 weeks, depending on the difficulty of the language. More than 90 percent of the students take harder languages to learn such as Arabic, Chinese Mandarin, Korean, Japanese, and Pashto. Students study five days a week, six hours per day, with two to three hours of homework each night. In addition to receiving a DLIFLC diploma, students can obtain an Associate of Arts degree in foreign language with the transfer of 18 college units in courses not offered at the Institute.




